

Harappan Civilisation



<u>Archaeology</u> is the study of the past by digging up and examining the remains of buildings, tools, and other artefacts.

Archaeologists excavate an area in sections, carefully digging and brushing away the layers of earth covering the evidence so they can study what lies beneath.

<u>Artefacts</u> are items that have been made by people. Historians and archaeologists examine carefully to work out what they can tell us about life in the past.

Studying these artefacts helps us to understand what jobs people did, how they entertained themselves, how they lived and what they believed in.


Today you are going to be historians, examining artefacts from the Indus Valley

HARAPPAN POTS

The Harappan people made pots, bowls, dishes, cups, and vases from clay which was fired or baked at a high temperature. Most pots were plain, but some were decorated with flower-like patterns or sometimes with animals.



Design your very own Harappan Pot using the pottery sherds as reference.




HARAPPAN JEWELLERY

Both men and women wore jewellery, including necklaces and bracelets.

Jewellery was made of gold, silver, ivory, clay, and beads. The beads were both very common and highly valued and used to make a wide range of jewellery. Some women wore more elaborate headdresses.

TOWN PLANNING

Mohen jo-Daro and Harappa were the biggest cities of the Indus Valley civilisation so far discovered. Other important Indus Valley cities included Kalibangan, Lothal and Banawali. Buildings in the cities were made from mud bricks which were dried out in the sun. The bricks were all made to the same standard size, the width was twice the depth and the length twice the width.
